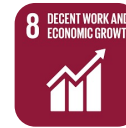

Support policies to address women and youth issues

- locally produced food contributes to resilience
 - increases food availability, enhances nutrition
 - improves farmers' livelihoods and creates job opportunities for other disadvantaged groups
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- Increased government revenue, increased incomes; creates employment, MSME and SMEs supported
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- Through food availability
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- Land use and resources; asset creation through availability of financing
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- Through employment creation - farm and off-farm jobs – again increased incomes
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- Supports local planning, policy formulation and budget preparation
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- Encourages gender responsive policies, financing mechanisms to address gender & youth businesses

WHY SHOULD AFRICAN COUNTRIES CO-LEAD AND CHAMPION THE PROTO-COALITION?

- A cross section of partners are already on board – will bring high visibility to the priorities of African countries in these two important areas
- Fits in with the SDG Agenda 2030; the African Agenda 2063
- **Local production and food supply chain** development as means of implementation of National Agriculture Investment Plan (NAIP) and compliance with the 2014 AU Malabo Declaration on accelerated agricultural growth and transformation Malabo declaration
- The **CAADP** implementation is nationally and **locally based** same as food systems' transformation
- Co-leading and linking to food systems transformation can support countries as they formulate and implement their National Agriculture and Food Security Investment Plan (NAFSIP) for financing by donors and to support technical co-operation and capacity building
- The adoption of the principles, values and guidelines to ensure that new generation of NAIP pursues the six percent annual growth of the agriculture sector as required by CAADP cannot be possible without **resilient local production and consumption and strong local supply chains**
- Increased domestic financial resources including public and private to comply with Malabo commitment will lead to **improved and transformed local food system and food supply chains**

WHAT IS EXPECTED OF THE CO-LEADS & CHAMPIONS?

- **Commitment to the coalition until 2030 and beyond**
- **Build coalitions with other countries** in other regions
- **Identify local priorities that reflect the objectives of the clusters** and the thematic areas:
 - Local Production for Local Consumption
 - Public Procurement
 - Empower women's agency
 - Land and asset creation
 - Local supply chains
- **Build coalitions with regional IFIs, local and regional private sector players**
- Propose **financing mechanisms** that will support post summit implementation
- **Propose national, regional and global actions and policy changes** that are required to support increased local production that address systemic imbalances that have been identified
